How do you celebrate Easter in a world that is absorbed with limiting the impact of the Coronavirus pandemic? How do you celebrate "new life" when all the news is about death and disease? How do you celebrate "resurrection" and a risen Savior when you are not able to gather with your faith community during Holy Week or on Easter Sunday?

Those are questions that have been on my mind now for a few weeks. As I write this column, we've not yet determined that we will not be holding in person worship services for Easter. However, I feel it likely that will be our decision as the day draws closer and the outbreak continues in our homeland.

So, let me come back to my questions. How do we celebrate Easter this year? I believe the answer to that question is found in the groundwork we've already laid in moving worship online, and in finding ways to stay connected as a congregation. We will celebrate the Risen Savior differently, but the same.

After our first Sunday with online worship a parishioner sent me a letter. He had picked up on some of the language I used that day, describing worship as being "different but the same". In his letter, this gentleman shared a song he'd written years ago by that title "Different But the Same". The chorus lyrics says:

"Oh, we're different, but the same; We're different, but the same." (repeat)

Isn't this true of all of life these days, including our observance of Holy Week and celebration of Easter? It will be different, yet it will be the same. We still serve a Risen Savior who's in the world today. We know that He is living, whatever folks may say. So, we will observe his Triumphal entry to Jerusalem. We will consider this Lamb of God who's come into the world and is the sacrificial lamb. We will share with Him in the Upper Room and follow him to Gethsemane, and wait vigil by a Garden Tomb, and then join the women in their early morning discovery. It will all be done a little differently, but the message – its impact is still the same – perhaps even more poignant in this day.

Until then: You ask me how I know He Lives? He lives within my heart!

Worship Pastor Candidate Weekend Moved to April 4-5, 2020

Dear Friends & Members of First Baptist:

After a year-long search process, during which time we encountered many candidates, and conducted interviews with several, **the Worship Pastor Search Committee is pleased to present our recommendation for the position of Worship Pastor at First Baptist Church, Mr. Daniel Kane.**

Daniel is a December 2019 graduate of Indiana Wesleyan University with dual Bachelors' degrees in Worship Arts and Music Ministry. A native of Kendallville, IN, and a pastor's son, Daniel is familiar with the life and rhythm of the local church. In his communication with our search team Daniel expressed an appreciation for different worship styles and spoke



of his experience in leading worship with the Whiteford Wesleyan Church (Ottowa Lake, MI) and as a Chapel Leader at Indiana Wesleyan University. We believe he will bring a solid understanding of blended worship and help us be open to creative and new forms of worship expression as we take our next steps as a congregation in worship together.

Throughout the interview process the search committee has been continuously impressed with Daniel and is excited about partnering with him in ministry. We look forward to being able to introduce you to our candidate, and plan to do so during the weekend of April 4-5.

We have pushed Daniel's candidate weekend back one week from its original date, but do not want to delay your meeting him any longer. We will be hosting an online meet and greet with Daniel on Saturday, April 4 from 4:00 to 5:00 p.m. He will then be leading worship along with Pastor Dan on Sunday, April 5 during our 9:30 a.m. live stream service.

We hope he will be able to start ministry with us in May.

Deadline: April 1

The E. Don Tull Scholarship is for a graduating high school senior planning to attend an institution of higher learning full-time next year and is in the amount of \$1,000.

Lenten Rose

This year we chose to use Lenten Rose for the season of Lent. The Lenten Rose is a magical little perennial that blooms in early spring, usually during Lent, hence the name. It is in the buttercup family, Helleborus genus, and closely related to the Christmas Rose. It comes in many colors, pale green edged in maroon, red-flushed, golden yellow, pink, white, dark purple (black) or even double colored and double flowered. The plant prefers shade, but will tolerate part shade as on the edge of a woodland. It can also be grown on the east side of a house protected from the hot afternoon sun. The blooms literally last a couple of months and this is a deer resistant plant. If you don't dead-head this plant, it will reseed itself producing baby plants the next year.

There are some interesting folklore stories about this pretty little plant: Pliny the Elder (?) claimed if an eagle saw you digging up a hellebore, he would cause your death. Pliny added you should draw a circle around the plant, face east and offer a prayer before digging. The remedy was not to be used on cloudy days. Mrs. Maude Grieve, a 20th century English herbalist claimed powdered hellbore could be scattered in the air or spread on the ground, walked on, and you would be rendered invisible. It is also said that Morgan Le Faye, King Arthur's sister, made a concoction of herbs, weeds, wildflowers including hellebores, and gave it to Guinevere to prevent her from being able to conceive. However, the best story is that a little girl named Maria was on her way to the stable to see Baby Jesus. She was crying because she was so poor and she didn't have a gift to give Him. And as she walked along, her tears melted the snow and a beautiful white flower, the hellebore, appeared.

This plant is truly a favorite of both Marsha and myself, and I will do my best to keep them going until we all meet again. If you would like one of these lovely perennials, please feel free to make a donation to the flower fund and you can take one. It won't be too late to plant them. I think there are 17 plants. Love and miss you all, it be glorious to be together again soon! (Deanna Glick)




Prevention Steps for Close Contacts

If you have had close contact with someone who is confirmed to have, or being evaluated for, COVID-19 infection, you should:

Monitor your health starting from the day you first had close contact with the person or traveled to a
country under a level 3 advisory or other area affected by COVID-19. Continue for 14 days after you last
had close contact with the person or traveled to a country under a level 3 advisory or other area affected
by COVID-19. Watch for these signs and symptoms:

- o Fever. Take your temperature twice a day.
- o Coughing.
- o Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing.
- Other early symptoms to watch for are chills, body aches, sore throat, headache, diarrhea, nausea/vomiting, and runny nose.

If you develop fever or any of these symptoms, call your healthcare provider right away. Please call
ahead so the provider can take appropriate precautions to prevent the spread of infection. Tell the provider
your symptoms and that you recently traveled to a country under a level 3 advisory or had close contact
with someone suspected of having COVID-19.





What you need to know about coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19)

What is coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19)?

Coronavirus disease 2019 (COVID-19) is a respiratory illness that can spread from person to person. The virus that causes COVID-19 is a novel coronavirus that was first identified during an investigation into an outbreak in Wuhan, China.

Can people in the U.S. get COVID-19?

Yes. COVID-19 is spreading from person to person in parts of the United States. Risk of infection with COVID-19 is higher for people who are close contacts of someone known to have COVID-19, for example healthcare workers, or household members. Other people at higher risk for infection are those who live in or have recently been in an area with ongoing spread of COVID-19. Have there been cases of COVID-19 in the U.S.?

Yes. The first case of COVID-19 in the United States was reported on January 21, 2020. The current count of cases of COVID-19 in the United States is available on CDC's webpage at https://www.cdc.gov/coronavirus/2019-ncov/cases-in-us.html.

How does COVID-19 spread?

The virus that causes COVID-19 probably emerged from an animal source, but is now spreading from person to person. The virus is thought to spread mainly between people who are in close contact with one another (within about 6 feet) through respiratory droplets produced when an infected person coughs or sneezes. It also may be possible that a person can get COVID-19 by touching a surface or object that has the virus on it and then touching their own mouth, nose, or possibly their eyes, but this is not thought to be the main way the virus spreads. What are the symptoms of COVID-19?

Patients with COVID-19 have had mild to severe respiratory illness with symptoms of

- fever
- · cough
- shortness of breath

What are severe complications from this virus?

Some patients have pneumonia in both lungs, multi-organ failure and in some cases death.

How can I help protect myself?

People can help protect themselves from respiratory illness with everyday preventive actions.

- · Avoid close contact with people who are sick.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth with unwashed hands.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds. Use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer that contains at least 60% alcohol if soap and water are not available.

If you are sick, to keep from spreading respiratory illness to others, you should

- · Stay home when you are sick.
- Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, then throw the tissue in the trash.
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces.

What should I do if I recently traveled from an area with ongoing spread of COVID-19?

If you have traveled from an affected area, there may be restrictions on your movements for up to 2 weeks. If you develop symptoms during that period (fever, cough, trouble breathing), seek medical advice. Call the office of your health care provider before you go, and tell them about your travel and your symptoms. They will give you instructions on how to get care without exposing other people to your illness. While sick, avoid contact with people, don't go out and delay any travel to reduce the possibility of spreading illness to others.

Is there a vaccine?

There is currently no vaccine to protect against COVID-19. The best way to prevent infection is to take everyday preventive actions, like avoiding close contact with people who are sick and washing your hands often.

Is there a treatment?

There is no specific antiviral treatment for COVID-19. People with COVID-19 can seek medical care to help relieve symptoms.
