Dear FBC Friends:

As I write this article, I am preparing for some vacation time away from the church office and my pastoral responsibilities. It will be more of a "stay-cation" this summer, as we welcome time with family and just try to rest and unwind. Spring break plans were put on hold back in March as the pandemic unfolded and it seems I've been running full tilt since trying to keep things together during a time when we've been apart.

To that end, I wanted to say "thank you" for your faithful efforts to stay engaged with your church during this unusual year. So many of you have participated in worship by live stream, and in-person. You've faithfully joined the ZOOM Bible studies and prayer calls. You've kept up your support of the ministry through your gifts. You've sent cards, notes, texts, letters and emails of support. You've helped us think through how to share ministry in such a time as this.

I would not be truthful if I didn't say that it's been a stressful season. I know that I am not alone in dealing with stress at work, or pandemic related; but I have tried to put the safety and well-being of this congregation in front of the decisions we've made, and guidelines we have instituted. Continued vigilance and compliance with efforts like face masks and social distancing will, unfortunately, be a reality for quite some time. Please help us keep these practices. Wear a mask when you are in the building, be that for worship or other times. It's a very practical way that we can love our neighbor.

During the month of August, I'll be sharing a series of sermons I'm calling, "Prayers of the People." I've chosen five Biblical prayers to see what we can discover about our own prayer life during this time from their example. I know that Pastor Daniel will be looking for ways to include other elements in worship that support this theme. He may even be asking you to help by providing prayers during this series.

Why Do We Sing?

"Why do I Sing?" Have you ever asked yourself that? I'd be curious to know what your answer is, and I'm not just asking about singing in church, but in general. Are you someone who finds yourself singing throughout the day whether someone is around or not? I am.

I've asked myself this question many times over the past several months, since graduation especially, because it's forced me to face the reality of who I am at the core. For example, last February I auditioned at Notre Dame for their Master's of Sacred Music program. Needless to say, I didn't get in, but that's not a bad thing. The whole process was new, and I had no idea what I was getting myself into. However, one of the many blessings of this strange weekend came when a third party, someone outside my own head, asked me the question, "Why do you sing?" My answer? "Because it's the best way for me to preach the Gospel." Little did I realize that I was actually answering a different question: "Who are you?"

I've said before that, to fulfill my job, I have to see myself as a pastor first and musician second. The above interaction solidified the degree to which I was willing to let go of my musicianship for the sake of something else. Who knew that, within a month, public singing would be nearly eliminated?

I think back on my answer now and remember much of what formed it. My former voice instructor, Keith Brautigam, helped me realize this when we were preparing for my senior recital. It certainly helped that we were preparing an entirely sacred recital, but, more importantly, he finally got the basic technique of singing to sink into my head. Singing is best accomplished when we are most free. We stand tall, take deep diaphragmatic breaths, and release all the tension from our body. Inevitably, it's when I try to release tension that I discover stress knots I never knew existed. This is a fascinating exercise because it's through this practice that I realized how subconsciously I hold onto control. It's only when I relinquish control for what I cognitively know to be better that I see the benefits of taking the risk of freedom. It's a vulnerable place. I don't like it. I don't know many people who do. But is that not the fruit of the Gospel? Christ calls us to lay down our lives for our neighbor, just as He did for us. It was when He was at His weakest that He showed His strength most. So too, ought we free ourselves of all the things we heap upon our lives, schedules, and identities? When all is stripped away and we stand free in Christ we realize what we truly have: the same foolishness Paul received, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." (2 Corinthians 12:9).

So, what happens when singing is taken away from a singing people? What happens when our expression of freedom is challenged? Do we find something else to express it? Maybe our expression of freedom in Christ takes the shape of our willingness to not sing for the sake of our neighbor? What if singing was a substance, something we could hold loosely in our palms, like sand which can be blown away with the slightest breeze? Do you close your fist to keep it from escaping, creating tension in your body? Or do you let it go? These are all uncomfortable questions! So much so that my body just tensed up as I typed them because even to think about letting something go is vulnerable. Even more unnerving is the realization that maybe the initial question of "Why do we sing?" is actually asking "Who are we?" What happens to that answer when singing is threatened?

Let's put a time frame on beginning to answer this question: August 30th to September 2nd. Soon, we will be asking ourselves, "Why do we sing?" a lot, because the Getty's Sing! Global 2020 conference is entirely about this question, and this year they're asking an even deeper question: Why do we sing Scripture? I'm really looking forward to beginning this journey of church-discovery with you, but until then, I leave you with the best I can: Jesus' words. Remember, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." (2 Corinthians 12:9)

- There will be opportunities for church members to contribute as well.
- Past participants will be contacted by email, informing them of the changes. For those who still wish to run/walk for the event, we hope to be able to offer a virtual option.

Healthy Living Tips

Make Your Home Safer

Housing conditions can significantly affect your health and safety. Take a few minutes to make your home healthy and safe.

- Remove hazards that increase the chance for falling, such as rugs, loose cords, and objects on the floor.
- · Check or change the batteries on your carbon monoxide alarm at least twice a year.
- Test smoke alarms monthly to ensure they work properly. For smoke alarms that use regular alkaline batteries, replace the batteries at least once a year. For smoke alarms that use lithium (long-life) batteries, replace the entire alarm unit every 10 years or sooner if it chirps or stops working.
- Keep cooking areas free of flammable objects, such as potholders and towels.
- Keep candles, medicine, household cleaners, and other chemicals out of children's reach, in locked or childproof cabinets.
- Don't use a gasoline or charcoal-burning device near a window, door, or vent, or inside your home, basement, or garage.
- Test your home for radon (a radioactive gas linked to lung cancer). You can purchase a kit at your local hardware or home improvement store.
- · Make your home smoke-free.
- · Keep medicines in their original bottles or containers.
